Sir Nigel Gresley to Visit the Nene Valley Railway

Thanks to the Sir Nigel Gresley Locomotive Trust, ex-LNER A4 'Pacific' no. 4498 (60007) *Sir Nigel Gresley* is scheduled to visit the Nene Valley for two weekends during April. This locomotive will be pulling passenger trains over the Easter Weekend 7th -10th April and on the following weekend, 15th & 16th April.



Sir Nigel Gresley was the 100th Gresley Pacific built by the Great Northern Railway / London and North Eastern Railway. Built at Doncaster as works N°1863, the locomotive entered service in 1937 following a naming ceremony at Marylebone station on 26th November. The locomotive was mainly based at London King's Cross, with a spell at Grantham during World War II, and was briefly re-numbered as N°7 before becoming N°60007 when the LNER was merged into British Railways. On 3rd June 1956, *Sir Nigel Gresley* had the honour of hauling the Royal Train from King's Cross to York with H.M. the Queen on board. The "Stephenson Locomotive Society Special" of the 23rd May 1959 was the first train in the UK with a booked schedule of over 100 mph and during that trip, N°60007 set the official post-war speed record for steam traction of 112 mph.

Sir Nigel Gresley is back in blue for the first time since being overhauled,

Tickets

Advance booking is advised but "All Day Rovers" can be purchased on the day, subject to availability.

A limited number of tickets will be on sale to ride the footplate of 60007, entering the footplate will be via the famous A4 corridor tender, which leads from the coaching stock to the locomotive footplate, you will then ride the footplate for approximately five minutes. Tickets for the Footplate Experience are limited and will be an additional payment on top of your standard travel ticket.

Extending the Line - Update

Work to extend the Mid-Suffolk Light Railway line from Dovebrook to Aspall Halt (on the line of the original trackbed) is being carried out by Colchester-based infrastructure company TES2000. These works commenced on Monday 16th January 2023 and lasted three weeks - until 3rd February.





To start with, each of 400 sleepers were drilled for the chairs and the rails dragged into position in the cess. During the first week some 300 tons of ballast had arrived on site – creating a sizeable pile in the car park.





Packs of 24 sleepers travelled down on a flatbed trolley and ballast travelled in a boxed trolley – pulled by one of the RRVs (Road-Rail Vehicle). The TES2000 track gang gave themselves a target of 3 panels of 60 ft rail per day. By the end of the first Friday 30% of the track was done – including ballasting and levelling.

Naturally, during this time the site was closed to all but a few MSLR support volunteers. Your editor, along with a handful of other guests, was invited to visit the site on 26th January to view progress. It is not yet known when the extension to Aspall Halt will be usable, although test trains will soon be run. The railway has still to obtain a Transport & Works Act Order before passengers can be carried on this extension.

Visiting loco 'Marcia', the 99-year-old Peckett 0-4-0T from the Kent & East Sussex Railway, will completing her outing with the MSLR on the weekend of 9th & 10th April before returning home.

A Coronation Gala is planned for Sunday 7th & Monday 8th, this being the additional Bank Holiday for the coronation of King Charles III. Then the next running days will be the 'Middy in the 40s' event on Sunday 28th & Monday 29th May. Trains will then run each Sunday (with various themes) through to the 'End of Season Steam-Up' on Sunday 3rd September 2023.

Questionnaire Results

At the end of 2022 we asked readers to give their views on a small number of questions about the future direction of the branch. By the closing date of 14 January 2023 some 24 responses had been received. In most instances the questions gave a few options including "Don't mind" or "Other". Some respondents also provided additional information or suggestions.

The following is a summary of the responses and our initial analysis –

Venue

Data

Hitchin 9, WGC 11, Digswell 3, Don't Mind 7, Other – Stevenage 1, Letchworth 1, Panshanger (WGC) 1.

Analysis

Adding in the "Don't Mind" number, 16 are happy with Hitchin and 18 with WGC. Proportionately this is in line with the current typical attendance at each venue. The other suggested venues may need further consideration if either of the current venues prove unsustainable.

Day of the Week

Data

Mon 1, Tue 8, Wed 2, Thur 4, Fri 2, Don't Mind 12.

Analysis

Again, adding in the Don't Mind number, the majority are content with the current choice of day, although one response indicated that Tue was not a good choice. With the considerable number of Don't Minds this suggests that the meetings could be held on different days of the week, but more data would be needed from members before making a change.

Time of Day

Data

Morning 2, Afternoon 12, Evening 7, Don't Mind 6

Analysis

Here the data indicates a less clear picture as the question was not cross-linked to the venue. Two respondents definitely wanted Hitchin meetings to be in the afternoon and seems probable that several who liked a Hitchin venue would prefer afternoons. However, an advantage of an evening meeting is that it provides for members who have not retired.

Travel

Data

Car 18, Bus 1, Train 3, Walk 1.

Analysis

It would be easy to conclude that as the majority currently travel to meetings by car, the choice of venue is not of paramount importance but any future change should, if possible, provide for public transport being a viable option.

Presentation Content

Data

Era: Steam 6, Modern 3, Any 16

Location: UK 9, Overseas 2, Any 14

Topic: Traction 2, Operational 4, Any 18

Analysis

The data largely speaks for itself. Most respondents seem happy with the somewhat eclectic mix that is currently provided. This aspect of the branch programme warrants further consideration in terms of balance.

Meeting Donations

Data

Members: £2 (3), £3 (11), £4 (7)

Non-members: £3:50 (3), £4:50 (10), £5 (5)

One respondent suggested £2:50 and £4:00.

Analysis

The majority of responses support an increase in meeting donations to, at least, £3 for members and £4:50 for non-members.

The March Presentations (1)

Harringworth Viaduct – A Victorian Gem - John Hillier

14th March at Hitchin



The River Welland in Flood

The talk takes us on a journey over the past-200 years or so when the area along on the banks of the River Welland, which form the border between Northamptonshire and Rutland, was transformed into a noisy thriving industrial landscape for about 4 years whilst the viaduct towering some 70 feet over the village of Harringworth was being built.

It was around here that in 1829 Thomas Cook, arguably Rutland's most famous resident, began work and where his marriage in Barrowden led to the birth of global travel. It was thanks to the 'The Railway Age' that communications were improved and which led eventually to an influx of people to the Welland Valley as workers came from far and wide to help build what was is *the longest continuous brick-built viaduct in the country*. Its completion in 1878 gave improved connectivity for passengers and freight travelling to and from London from the Midlands and the North.

Whilst the viaduct was being built lawlessness and strife were commonplace although steps were taken to improve the welfare and conditions of the thousands of people who had gravitated to the area to work. Construction of the line between Kettering and Manton also led to the development of Corby as a 'steel town' and a host of supporting quarries and industries.

Today, even though traffic flows have reduced, the viaduct still plays an important part in the UK rail system and even carries trains running direct into and from Europe. Although the local quarries became silent in the 1970's, after several years when the sounds of quarrying were no more, quarrying has now begun again in the nearby hills which means that that these sounds once again mingle with those in such a rural location.

The talk will end with a varied selection of views, many unique, showing the various moods of Harringworth Viaduct taken by the speaker over the past 30 years or so.

Notes about the speaker - John Hillier

Although he first visited the area in 1969 it was not until the mid-1980's that John Hillier first saw the Viaduct and it was thanks to a move in 1992 with his family from the Peak District to within sight of the structure that he became captivated by 'the 82 arches'. John then began to put his railway interests and photographic skills to good use by recording the viaduct in its many moods.

A member of the Railway Photographic Society since 1965, and Chairman of Stamford and Rutland Photographic Society for several years, 'the viaduct' continues to feature in his work and the talk will show how the viaduct can be photographed from so many different angles and positions.

The talk will include images taken from many vantage points around the area plus some taken from the air and also from the footplate of "Bahamas" when it crossed the viaduct in October 2021. John project-managed the overhaul of this steam locomotive after having raised over £1m to restore it to working order once again.

John has authored several books and his work also appears in print from time to time. He recently organised the Young Railway Photographer of the Year Competition which resulted in an exhibition at the National Railway Museums at York and Shildon He took part in the "Architecture of the Railways Built" TV programme about the viaduct and has recently been involved with more filming by the viaduct, this time taking part in a film for the NRM about "Flying Scotsman", an engine that has travelled across the viaduct several times.



Treasurer's Report & Accounts for Year to 31st October 2021

I am pleased to present this report for the twentieth AGM of the branch and my fourth as Treasurer.

Attached to this report is the Income and Expenditure report for the year in two formats – the first shows comparison with last year and the second splits the year being reported by location. The coronavirus pandemic has had a major effect on the figures for both years with last year only covering the 6 months to March 2020 when we entered the first lockdown and the current year covering zoom meetings in the earlier months and live ones from August 2021.

There has been no income from exhibitions since Stevenage in January 2020 and the sooner we can get back doing these the better.

The door/raffle money per meeting for members at £2 and visitors at £3.50 has been the same since September 2019 and no amendment to these rates will be made for the current financial year.

With regard to the funds shown as held by the Society, please note we, as a branch, are not allowed under Society rules to keep any funds in excess of £2,500 with the balance being transferred to the Society and held by them in a ring-fenced account. This means they cannot use it and it is available as and when we need to call some down, which we expect to do to enable us to pay bills in the current year. Any interest earned on these funds is retained by the Society but at 0.02% would only have given us 73p in the year. The slight reduction in funds held by the Society reflects transactions with them during the year.

It is anticipated that we will make a further loss in the next financial year until we get back to attending exhibitions and our members feel more able to attend the restarted live meetings.

Reports for the 2023 Branch AGM

Chairman's Report 2022-23

First, I must pay tribute to the Branch Committee without whom we could not function. I do the easy bit, standing at the front talking! Without my colleges providing the "script" I would be lost. I also wish to thank John Dossett for his tireless work on producing what is widely regarded as the best branch newsletter around. I also wish to thank Dave Elsdon and Vic's wives for providing our refreshments since our return to live meetings following Covid. This was supposed to be a temporary arrangement, but to date nobody else has volunteered. If you are able to help, please let us know, as we cannot expect others to help out indefinitely. Being the last to submit their report to the AGM leaves me little unique to say, so perhaps I should concentrate on the "bigger picture".

All railway clubs (and indeed other clubs) are suffering decreasing memberships and attendances over the last few years, worse since Covid. Treasurer's Report 2022-23 & Financial Summary for the Year to 31st October 2022

Yet another year has passed when I have had to report a loss for the year. If only I could see a profit at some time in the future.

Attached to this report is the Income and Expenditure report for the year in two formats – the first shows comparison with last year and the second splits the year being reported by location. The result of the coronavirus pandemic has affected the figures for both years as the number of members attending live meetings has not returned to pre pandemic levels.

We attended one exhibition in the year at Welwyn Garden City in April and it was good to get back to the old routine. We currently have two exhibitions booked for the current year –Luton on 22nd April and Welwyn Garden City on 29th April.

The door donation money per meeting currently is £2.00 for members and £3.50 for visitors has remained the same since September 2019. These rates will be reviewed by the Committee prior to September 2023 as the increased cost of hall hire makes some increase unavoidable.

In the closing balances the funds shown as held by the Society are there as we, as a branch, are not allowed under Society rules to keep any funds in excess of £2,500 with the balance being transferred to the Society and held by them in a ring-fenced account. This means they cannot use it and it is available as and when we need to call some down. Any interest earned on these funds is retained by the Society but at 0.02% would only have given us 70p in the year. The reduction in funds held by the Society reflects the sum of £750 drawn down by the branch during the last year to give us day to day funds. It is anticipated that a further sum will be drawn down in the current year as the lack of income from exhibitions remains.

Let's hope the current financial year will show some signs of positivity.
