

Workshop Wanderings – Steve Lacey

In this update about the goings-on at the Nene Valley Railway, following my sojourn as Father Christmas, there is quite a lot to report, mainly you may be glad to know in picture form!

Firstly, *City of Peterborough* has finally been re-wheeled, but sadly this is only to make the chassis mobile, rather than a huge step towards completion. As previously reported, the boiler repair is still several years away from completion, in a queue, off site!




Secondly, *Blue Circle*, which has been one of the most reliable steam engines, has now come to the end of its ticket and was dismantled, prior to its transport away to have boiler work done. It did however, give some unique views of the workings of this unusual locomotive.





Thirdly, the wagon group has been improving the rake of vans, by fitting brake cylinders to a number of its wagons, in order to have a fitted head. This gives more flexibility to the locomotives used on it's freight charters/driving courses. They have also been building up, with weld, some of the wasted horn guides.



Fourthly, the Norwegian coach has arrived in the main workshop, for restoration to running order, as a very suitable pairing with the Danish F Class, which is undergoing final trials before entering service. Initially looking not too bad, stripping has soon revealed some rot and seized window mechanisms. This was as a result of storage outside, under the A1 bridge for a number of years and a broken window after a filming role!



The Norwegian coach:



Inside the 72-seater coach there are "tram-style" bidirectional seats, some ancient electrics, a beautiful set of ashtrays (now thankfully redundant on our railways).



There is also a definitely Norwegian-style of emergency cabinet contents!

I guess fallen trees and snow are a big hazard on Norwegian railways in winter; hence the two wood saws and an ice axe!



Even *92 Squadron* gets a mention (of course), as on 17th January she had a warming fire in, prior to a hydraulic test on the 18th.

I asked, why a fire for a hydraulic test? The answer, you should not subject a boiler to hydraulic pressures (up to 350psi in our case) when the steel is below 7deg c. Hence, a warming fire to raise the water temperature enough to be able to do the test without damage.

We all learn something new every day!

Rampton Level Crossing

- a short story by Martin Elms

I was on my grocery delivery trip on 3rd June 1968, proceeding on my usual route from Long Stanton to Oakington and then along a side-road adjacent to RAF Oakington which had closed some four years previously.

To my right was the railway branch line, now only from Cambridge to St Ives and with just a basic timetable of a DMU about every hour. I followed the road, glancing at the empty disused airfield on the left, now slowly being returned to farmland, although there is a persistant rumour of a future new town on the site.

The road branched, I followed the right-hand road away from the airfield and stopped at the user-worked Rampton Road accommodation level crossing. Following the rules, I left the van checked both ways for no trains, crossed over and opened the far gate away from the line. I retraced my steps, fully opened the near gate and, checking again, drove over. Then I closed both gates before continuing to Cottenham to complete my deliveries.

About an hour later, I returned to the level crossing to continue back to Long Stanton, again carefully following the gate opening procedures. I noticed a Permanent Way gang at work on the line on the Oakington side of the crossing. One of them glanced up at me and waved. I returned the greeting and crossed back to the van. Checking again, I drove over, noticing the gang on my left busy with something on the track.

I stopped clear of the gate and had my attention drawn by a series of load whistles and, in my wing mirrors, I saw a passenger train, hauled by a steam loco, from the Oakington direction screech over the crossing with clouds of dust rising from the protesting brakes. The train stopped on the Long Stanton side of the crossing with the last coach just clear.

I got out of the van and ran back to the crossing as the train guard started to climb down from the coach as he looked despairingly towards the PW gang. I also looked, two men appeared to be crouching over and attending to others still on the track. It looked as if they have been hit by the train which I am convinced wasn't in sight when I looked the few moments before I crossed and, anyway, what was a steam loco hauled train doing on this dead-end branch? I returned to my van switched the engine off and returned to the crossing to see if I could help or get assistance.

I entered the crossing and looked left. The train had vanished and looking the other way so had all the PW gang!!

Looking to my left, in the quiet atmosphere of the tranquil location after the RAF station closed, I saw travelling from the direction of Longs Stanton to Oakington a DMU approaching. It was gently rolling and swaying in manner I was accustomed to on the now very lightly used railway.

The driver sounded a friendly whistle and gave an acknowledging wave of this hand in recognition of my presence as the DMU passed over the crossing. I saw the few passengers looking vacantly out.

Soon all was quiet again except for the engine noise of a tractor busily ploughing on the airfield, with a flock of seagulls following it, and the sound of a blackbird in a nearby tree - all normal.

What had happened, where was everybody? I closed the crossing gates which I had left open in my haste to help. Slowly, I walked back to and got into my van - and had a long think about what had happened. After a while I restarted the van and, somewhat in a dream, prepared to drive, turning back towards Oakington. I saw a vehicle approaching. The road being narrow I concentrated on keeping well to the left, leaving room for the vehicle, which I noticed was a RAF lorry in World War II camouflage with covered headlamps. The driver in brown overalls and beret acknowledge me and the lorry rumbled by. It must be a preserved lorry done up in war colours I thought, probably from Duxford Museum which was about ten miles away.

As I drove on my way, I heard the really load noise of an aircraft. Looking to my right over the airfield, I saw a Lancaster bomber climbing away towards me, the noise of its straining engines filling the van with sound and vibrations. I knew I had a 35mm camera in the glove compartment, which I used for the chance of catching anything unusual on my travels – so far it hadn't been used much!!

Something else to do with Duxford I thought. I reached into the glove compartment grabbed the camera and exited the van in less time than it takes to tell. I stood and prepared to focus the camera at the aircraft ready for "the picture of the year."

Nothing in sight.

Just the continual sound of the tractor and the blackbird.

East West Rail

Track Progress (at end-2023)

"Track laying is nearly finished along first connection stage of East West Rail (EWR) as the New Track Construction (NTC) train completes its 58th and final shift.

Once complete, there'll be 66km of new track between Bletchley and Bicester with the final welding, stressing and 'tamping' (track alignment) works to be completed in the new year."



Installation of the signalling and telecoms equipment needed to operate the railway is also well underway, and once completed, will be followed by dynamic train testing before the railway reopens in 2025. Once open, this section of line will provide direct passenger services between Oxford, Bletchley and Milton Keynes for the first time in over 50 years.

New Track Construction Train



This phase of the project is being delivered by the East West Rail Alliance which was appointed by Network Rail to construct the Bicester to Bletchley section of new railway. The track itself has been laid by a state of the art NTC train, one of only two such machines in the whole country.

The NTC train uses an automated track laying system which is faster than using conventional track laying methods and can lay up to 1km of new track a day. Use of the NTC train has also helped to remove around 4,000 lorry journeys from local roads during the construction period.

Thomas being named by Rev W Awdry

The 0-6-0T engine No. 1800 was built by Hudswell Clarke in 1947 at about the time when Rev. W Awdry wrote his second book in which Thomas appeared. The little blue engine spent its entire working life at the British Sugar Corporation Peterborough factory pushing wagons of sugar beet up an incline, until the day came when a diesel engine replaced the steam power of Thomas.

The Peterborough Railway Society purchased this delightful little engine on 9th September 1973 and he was moved to the Nene Valley Railway, where he has since delighted his friends and children of all ages.



The February Presentations (1)

Edward Thompson, Wartime CME

- Simon Martin



"I have much to do, gentlemen, and little time in which to do it".

These words are attributed to Edward Thompson and have been taken in the past as meaning little time in which to enact change, specifically to the work of his predecessor, Sir Nigel Gresley. How far was this true, was the question posed by Simon A.C. Martin when he started his research on the L.N.E.R.'s second C.M.E. over a decade and a half ago.

13th February, at Hitchin

Edward Thompson: Wartime C.M.E.

This presentation showcases the research Simon has put together, and examines the primary evidence available to the general public, together with an analytical approach to the statistics held at the National Archives at Kew. We look closely at Edward Thompson's decision-making in the full context of the time on the railway from the period from just before Gresley's death, to the years after and the way in which he handed the baton on to Arthur Peppercorn, after these tumultuous war years.

We then examine each of the designs produced under Thompson, and the work carried out on his predecessor's locomotives in relation to the aim to bring the best out of them using the resources available at the time. Finally, we will have a group discussion on the documents found, their relative importance, and ask the question "do you feel differently?" at the end, after the discussion.

My presentation covers from 2020 to date and is biased to the southern part of the area - as that's where I live (Shenfield)!

During this period, with its numerous lockdowns and restrictions, Greater Anglia transitioned from loco-hauled coaching sets to EMUs on its InterCity services and to Stansted Airport. It completed the transition from the previous mainly BR-era DMUs on regional services to the Stadler bi-modes and the EMU fleet, with some temporary augmentation, replaced by the Class 720s and the Class 345s of the Elizabeth line.

On the freight side, various changes have occurred, including the new Tilbury 2 port, replacing/augmenting existing infrastructure and new flows such as ballast from Lowestoft.

Hopefully a good coverage which will be of interest!

Treasurer's Report 2022-23 & Financial Summary for the Year to 31st October 2022

Yet another year has passed when I have had to report a loss for the year. If only I could see a profit at some time in the future.

Attached to this report is the Income and Expenditure report for the year in two formats — the first shows comparison with last year and the second splits the year being reported by location. The result of the coronavirus pandemic has affected the figures for both years as the number of members attending live meetings has not returned to pre pandemic levels.

We attended one exhibition in the year at Welwyn Garden City in April and it was good to get back to the old routine. We currently have two exhibitions booked for the current year — Luton on 22nd April and Welwyn Garden City on 29th April.

The door donation money per meeting currently is £2.00 for members and £3.50 for visitors has remained the same since September 2019. These rates will be reviewed by the Committee prior to September 2023 as the increased cost of hall hire makes some increase unavoidable.

In the closing balances the funds shown as held by the Society are there as we, as a branch, are not allowed under Society rules to keep any funds in excess of £2,500 with the balance being transferred to the Society and held by them in a ring-fenced account. This means they cannot use it and it is available as and when we need to call some down. Any interest earned on these funds is retained by the Society but at 0.02% would only have given us 70p in the year. The reduction in funds held by the Society reflects the sum of £750 drawn down by the branch during the last year to give us day to day funds. It is anticipated that a further sum will be drawn down in the current year as the lack of income from exhibitions remains.

Let's hope the current financial year will show some signs of positivity.

Treasurer's Report 2023-24 & Financial Summary for the Year to 31st October 2023

Wonder of wonders, I'm able to report a PROFIT for the financial year. I have a feeling that this may be a one-off occurrence.

Attached to this report is the Income and Expenditure report for the year in two formats – the first shows comparison with last year and the second splits the year being reported by location. The profit this year is almost equal to the loss last year so in two years we have managed to stay still.

The profit has been made for three reasons:

- 1) Savings on hall hire costs following the move form Ludwick Way to Digswell for the Welwyn meetings.
- 2) Increased attendances at Digswell in particular.
- 3) Finally, the sales of books donated to us by the Cole family following the sad death of David Cole, our branch founder. The increase on book sales and exhibition income are down mainly to these books. We continue to hold some of these books in stock and these are available at our meetings.

The door donation money per meeting currently is £3.00 for members and £5.00 for visitors. We do not foresee any increase in the current financial year.

In the closing balances the funds shown as held by the Society are there as we, as a branch, are not allowed under Society rules to keep any funds over £2,500 with the balance being transferred to the Society and held by them in a ring-fenced account. This means they cannot use it and it is available as and when we need to call some down. Unlike the previous year we have not drawn down any funds and I do not see the need to do so in the current year.

For once I can see the branch being financially viable for the next few years.

One final point, if any member is interested in becoming assistant treasurer, please let me know.
